YOU are the focus of this course and I'm sure you can't think of a more interesting topic to study[©]. Course Description: This course is designed to help students demonstrate an understanding and appreciation for the impact and significance of career choices on their 1) social, 2) psychological, and 3) physiological experiences through the life span. This course is also structured to help students identify their interests, skills, values and personality traits, conduct career research and exploration, and learn current job seeking skills. Students will analyze the relationship between themselves, their life choices and the ongoing process of career planning and self-development throughout the life span.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- A. Identify and analyze psychological (e.g. stress, self-management, life transitions, etc.), physiological (e.g. impact of aging and disability on career/life choices), and sociological (e.g. demographic, socioeconomic, familial, global, etc.) influences on education, career, and personal decision-making. A.
- B. Compare and contrast the assumptions of student and career development theories and their implications for education and career choice over the lifespan.
- C. Identify the different options within the higher education system and factors which contribute to college success.
- D. Demonstrate ability to integrate knowledge of theories and concepts with self-awareness in order to identify appropriate life and career choices.

Homework Assignments: 300 total (100 points at each of three check-points)

Assignments are due at the beginning of class and are designed to keep everyone on the same page in assessing who you are, what you want and how to get it. Stay on top of your assignments to maximize what you get out of the course. YOU are the subject of this class, so it should be fun experience of self-discovery and planning for your future[©].

In-class Activities & Online Participation: 150 points total (10 points each for 15 activities/discussion threads)

This class focuses on engaging activities, participation, interaction, self-reflection and communication, thus being on-time and present is critical to your success. Punctuality and engagement are essential transferable job-skills that will help you beyond your classroom experience. In addition, this class is hybrid and requires significant work to be completed online. In addition to completing your online 10-year plan, you will also need to participate in discussion threads related to weekly readings, videos, etc.

Career Center Activity & Presentation: 100 points

You will take advantage of one (or more) of the various resources available through the Campus Career Center and will report back to the class. Additional grading criteria will be provided in class.

<u>Midterm: 100 points</u>

The Midterm will be emailed to you on Friday, September 29th 2017; it will cover Chapters 1 – 7 and will be an opportunity to share your responses to key themes covered in the first half of the semester. It will be a take-home midterm and will be due via email to me by 11:59 p.m. Wednesday, October 4th, 2017.

Mock Interview: 50 points

You will participate in a mock interview experience to help you hone your techniques and skills so that you'll be better prepared for interviews in the future.

My 10-Year Plan and Professional Portfolio: 100 Points

Over the course of the semester, you will develop an online, comprehensive 10-Year Career and Education Plan. Your final portfolio will include your 10-year Plan along with a professional resume, cover letter, awards, applications, interview questions/responses, and any other support documents to help you prepare for your future. You will present your professional portfolio during the final class.

Career Investigation Project & Presentation: 200 points

You will select a career field(s) to research and will conduct job shadow as well as an Informational Interview with two professionals in your desired field(s). You will present your findings to the class so that others will benefit from expanded awareness about different careers. Additional grading criteria will be provided in class.

- Advisory: Students who are not eligible for one level below transfer level English should complete the appropriate coursework before enrolling. Do not expect to pass this class without having completed the skills recommendation. You will not be allowed to use an electronic translator for exams in this class.
- All electronic devices need to be turned off AND out of visible sight during class unless we are using technology for an inclass activity or assignment. If you choose to use an electronic device during class you will lose 5 points from your participation grade each time you use it.
